#### HISTORICAL FICTION

Historical fiction is not nonfiction It weaves fiction in with history. Not a biography.

- There are different kinds of historical fiction.
  - I. General historical fiction literary, women's fiction, commercial.
  - 2. Genre historical fiction historical romance, westerns, mystery.
  - 3. Speculative historical fiction historical fantasy, paranormal, alternate history
  - 4. You can be strict or play fast and loose with history.

# **SETTING**

- Go to the place you are writing about.
- Check almanacs, records, modern maps, and weather.
- Read books about your setting and time period. Both nonfiction and fiction.
- Watch films, TV, and documentaries.



# DO NOT INJECT MODERN MORALS INTO HISTORY

- To truly understand history, you cannot judge it by today's moral standards.
  - I. Even some of our best humanitarian pioneers wouldn't hold up to modern morals.
- Do not sanitize. Leave your biases and preconceived notions at the door.
- In order to write history accurately, put yourself in that time period's mindset no matter how distasteful.
  - I. African Americans were considered property.
  - 2. Women were married off after their first menstrual cycle.







He was human.






# **RELATIONSHIPS**

- "Well, gentlemen, I'll tell you you who set great store by manners and culture, and rightly so, provided it's the real thing – what is more cultured, more sensitive, more manly: to forsake a woman or to take on a forsaken one?"

## **THEMES**

- Like relationships, larger themes can bring a reader closer to the character they are reading about.
- A human touchstone in someone's life that represents something larger than themselves.
- Often helpful when very little is known about that person.
- Even the most obscure person can be relatable if you find common ground.
- In the end, that is the task to make someone long dead relatable to a reader today.



#### IMMERSING READERS THROUGH LANGUAGE

- Language can be the easiest way to bring a character and time period to life.
- Written vs Oral language. Class difference in dialogue.
- Contractions (don't, won't, can't) and articles (a, an, the).
  - Contractions are common except in... Non-native speakers, written correspondence, and more proper language of the 17<sup>th</sup>-19 centuries.
- Some words and phrases are more modern and don't apply to older time periods.
  - Allergy and Autism
- Slang changes the meaning of common words.
  - "Bless your heart" and "That dog don't hunt."

# DIALOGUE AND SLANG

## OFFENSIVE LANGUAGE

- Martha Jane Canary, better known as Calamity Jane, drank like a cowboy and swore like one too.
- The idea of bad language in a western may offend older readers who grew up with John Wayne movies, and that's okay.
- Old, derogatory slang may offend today's readers, and that's okay. (The old west was racist and sexist)
